Settling down in the Brussels-Capital Region entails tackling some immediate practical questions such as opening a bank account or taking a health insurance. Opening up a bank account is easy and straightforward. Just go to any bank office and take a proof of identity and you will be able to open a bank account in no time. A house insurance is not mandatory when renting but is strongly advised or will at least often be a contractual obligation in a lease agreement.
